Dear Friends,

call 'the Church's Birthday'. Whit (Spirit) Sunday is associated with the Jewish festival of Shavuot (the Feast of Weeks) which commemorates Moses bringing down the Law from Mount Sinai, and many of the customs associated with it reflect the anticipation of waiting for such a special revelation from God. In Greek the festival is called Pentecost. because it occurs on the fiftieth day after Passover, and Christians have adopted this title for Whit Sunday because it occurs on the fiftieth day after Jesus' resurrection (counting Easter Sunday as the first day). The theme of waiting in anticipation also runs through Christian celebrations. After Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection his followers did a lot of waiting. During that time, they must have spent much time thinking about what Jesus had said and done, about their experiences of meeting their risen Lord and reflecting on what might happen next. There must have been a lot of speculative discussion about how their lives might be different when they came out of their current seclusion, and about how they might go about continuing Jesus' mission

According to Acts chapter 1, after Jesus' ascension they returned to Jerusalem, according to his instruction, to await the coming of the Holy Spirit. They spent their waiting time praying and beginning to make practical preparations, such as choosing someone to replace Judas Iscariot. So, when the Holy Spirit came with inspiration and power, they were ready to respond like a sailing ship whose

sails fill with the wind. In the light of this Biblical precedent: even though the prospect of churches reopening still may seem distant, we too spend this waiting time in preparation so that we are ready to catch the wind of the Spirit and to follow her lead when the time comes.

Message from the leadership team

Today our Bible study group looked at the passage from Acts 1:6-14, where Luke writes about Jesus ascending to heaven. In order to support our discussions, we listened to a reflection from the Methodist church in York by Rev Andy. He writes "The passage starts poorly, with the Disciples falling into old patterns of thinking about Jesus and his Kingdom, but Jesus promises all the power they need will come with the Spirit." We talked about the opportunities we have now in lockdown to share our faith and how we are experiencing a new way of being. We also reflected we too were perhaps at risk of falling into old patterns when we emerge from lockdown, and we too might benefit from pausing, and waiting for the Spirit's guidance before embarking on old patterns of being. This week we held our first action group meeting following the ROC conversation in March which brought together nearly 200 people from churches, Christian charities, Councillors, and community groups. The action group was smaller numbers with about 40 people taking part by Zoom. The group split into the four main areas which were highlighted by the ROC conversation. These are:

- Loneliness and social isolation
- Mental health
- Young people
- An 'other' group which includes communication about the work taking place.

Each group talked about the issues and where action might usefully start. It is not too late to join an action group even if you were not able to join the ROC conversation. Contact Daniela (Foundry Co-ordinator) or Hugh Bowerman or I if you would like to get involved. If not please pray for the work of the action groups as we take forward the work of the Foundry and bear

A Word in Season - 10 **Sparrows and Pigeons**

How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord of hosts! My soul longs, indeed, it faints for the courts of the Lord, my heart, and my flesh sing for joy to the living God. Even the sparrow finds a home, and the swallow [a starling in my case] a nest for herself, where she may lay her young, at your altars, O Lord of hosts my king and my God. (Psalm 84:1-2 NRSVA)

Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? We have been able to see the young Yet not one of them is forgotten in God's sight. But even the hairs of your head are all counted. Do not be afraid; you are of more value than many sparrows. (Luke 12:6-7 NRSVA)

These verses remind us that we are precious to God and we are not isolated from our God.

Recently I have been struggling a bit with lockdown particularly when, as the Sunday before last shows, the technology doesn't work properly. I was very frustrated that I couldn't share the Zoom service. It was nobody's fault, but it left me feeling 'down'. I haven't physically seen Bernhard, Jessica, Isobel, and Clara for over 3 months, or had the usual four or five services to prepare and deliver, and I miss Armchair Yoga at Trinity on a Tuesday.

Why Sparrows and Pigeons? Those verses above make me aware of how much God cares about me and how important it is to use some of the space 'lockdown' brings just to talk to God. I seem to spend a lot of time just talking to my Lord about the washing up, the garden and the birds. I have found one of the great benefits of lockdown is the bird table in the garden. This year we have never had so many sparrows. We have watched at least five or six pairs feeding and then realised they were coming back more frequently and were obviously feeding young. Now we have five or six families arriving to feed. It is fascinating to watch.

For many years we have had starlings nesting and breeding in the eaves. They always come back to the same place every year and this year is no exception. starlings appearing now. We also have our regular two or three pigeons. I know many people don't really like them, but I can't chase them way. The feeders have never been busier or perhaps we have never noticed it all before. With the other birds - robins, blue tits, jackdaws, magpies, and even the parakeets

chattering noisily as they fly over, it's like Christ each day. a Birdway Service Station.

All this new life and activity is a reminder to me that there is hope just over the horizon. Things will get better, perhaps not as we expect but there will be a new 'normal'. This weekend the pigeons have reminded me about their cousins - doves. The dove is the symbol of peace and new life as Noah discovered, and the Holy Spirit. This coming Sunday is Pentecost when we remember the Holy Spirit coming across a table at the end of someone's with tongues of fire and rushing wind upon garden, with books set out, and a note inthe disciples and the dramatic change it made to their lives. Last week we celebrated the power of the Holy Spirit coming upon the Wesley Brothers.

But the Holy Spirit is not just a powerful force coming from the outside, for Jesus promised:

If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and set this week's. Her internet router and he will give you another Advocate (John 14:15 NRSVA)

That is within us - helping, holding, supporting, encouraging, caring for us, like a mother. I am a Dad and a Granddad but there is something about a mother that I cannot match, not just that I cannot give birth to a child, I have always, and still do love my children and grandchildren but I go along with those who see a feminine side of God in the Holy Spirit. We are wrapped in God's love. God is always with us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, especially now when we are seeing the hope of a sunrise but are still 'locked down'.

I leave you with one of our more modern 'Worship Songs' by Margaret V. Old but sung to an old Scottish folk tune, The Skye Boat Song.

Spirit of God, unseen as the wind, gentle as is the dove, teach us the truth and help us believe, show us the Saviour's love.
