Message from Rev Jackie Case

Dear Friends,

It was wonderful to see so many (about 50) gathered at Trinity for worship on Sunday morning. Although everyone in the congregation had to wear masks, the eyes are indeed 'the windows of the soul' and some limited fellowship was able to be shared at a safe distance. We were very much experimenting with how to manage people's arrival and entry into the worship area and their exit from it; how to incorporate music when we aren't able to sing; how to continue familiar features such as the stories from the congregation; and how to share the service in the homes of those unable to attend in person. My personal thanks to all those who did so much thinking and planning before the day, those who contributed in any way to the service, and those who cleaned chairs etc. to enable Foundry worship to take place later. I am delighted that, although it is not yet practical to do work with the children on site, they are still receiving zoom worship and activities at 11.00am on Sunday mornings.

As a result of our experiences on Sunday, you will find that some improvements to the processes and layout will have been made by next Sunday. We especially hope that, with the help of James Turner, our broadcasting of the service to those at home will be much improved, and we will further develop our ability to use the electronic equipment and our resources as the weeks go by. Many of us have learnt a great deal in a short time about the technological possibilities available to us, and we need to build a team of people to make better use of the opportunities now available to us to serve, not only our current membership, but also the future mission of the church. As I drove home from Woking on Sunday, I found myself reflecting on what the Lord Jesus Christ would have said to his first disciples if they had been faced with COVID and its challenges. Of course there were infectious diseases then that blighted the lives of the infected and isolated them from family and society. Leprosy, for example, was universally feared: at the first signs of infection sufferers were sent away from family friends and society as a whole, losing their livelihoods and becoming dependent upon charitable gifts of food and clothing left outside the town or village, where they lived in groups for mutual support. Leprosy came to Europe with returning crusaders and remained a scourge for centuries. The last leper colony in Europe, on an island near Cyprus, was not closed until 1950s! In Mark's account of Jesus's healing of a leper, the Greek words used for Jesus' attitude are most literally translated, 'he was filled with anger' [Mark 1:41]. Jesus was angry at the evil that disrupts life and destroys well-being, isolating people like this man from community and loved ones. I am sure that the Lord Jesus supports us to do whatever we have to do to protect the vulnerable from Coronavirus and is encouraging us to do whatever we can to make it better for those whose well-being has been so compromised by the Covid pandemic. **Every Blessing** Jackie

As the Covid 19 related restrictions extend into the future as far as we can see, the Leadership Team has been thinking hard about how to continue worship and extend our witness beyond those who regularly join our Zoom services. The next step for us would be to transmit our services through a YouTube Channel, which we know many other churches are doing successfully, so that everyone can access the worship through the Trinity Website and Youtube.

This is called Live Streaming.

We know Live Streaming is not the total answer, but John heard Justin Welby at New Wine last week saying that at Canterbury Cathedral, they would get 25 people to Morning Prayers, 40 max each day before Lock Down, and now between 40K and 50K from all over the world watch the YouTube feed every day! So it can work, very well.

The cost of the equipment to do this properly is quite modest at around £1,000 and even though our finances have taken a huge battering since the 'Lock Down' Trinity can find that money. However, perhaps this is a Project that you might feel you would like to help on its way and make an extra donation towards that cost.
