‘Refugee Tales’ and Gatwick Detainee Welfare Group

Refugee Tales is an outreach project of Gatwick Detainees Welfare Group, inspired by the experiences of men held in immigration detention at Gatwick, over a 20-year period of visiting.

The UK is the only country in Europe that detains people indefinitely. Refugee Tales hosts a self-advocacy project for people with lived experience of detention who share their tales with parliamentarians and people of influence and calls for change. People in detention cannot leave and have very limited freedom of movement within the centres. Security levels are similar to prisons.

Since 2015, Refugee Tales walkers have made a large scale walk every summer, as well as shorter monthly walks, in

solidarity with refugees, asylum seekers and people who have been held in immigration detention. Around half of people held in immigration detention are asylum seekers, and many have family ties in the UK. Around 25,000 migrants are detained in the UK every year.
